Later Life Ambitions is determined to ensure that the voice of people in later life is heard during the General Election. Our manifesto lays out our vision for a better deal for the 11 million people in later life throughout the UK. From the creation of an Older People's Commissioner in England and Scotland to the establishment of a National Social Care Service, and from maintaining the State Pension triple lock to delivering a National Housing Strategy, we are focused on issues that impact older people the most. We require bold and forward-looking action from our political leaders to address the challenges that we will all face in the future.

By 2030, there will be almost 13 million people in later life. The issues we face today will also impact on future generations unless today's policymakers are willing to confront the challenges now.

We need your help to get this message to candidates across the UK and make sure our manifesto is supported and understood.

This user friendly toolkit has been created to help supporters communicate with their local candidates. It includes guidance on how to find out who your local candidates are, how to contact them and tips on what to say.

STANDING BY PENSIONERS: A MANIFESTO FOR LATER LIFE

Our manifesto sets out what we need to get a better deal for older people We want the next Government to:

- Create a Commissioner for Older People and Ageing for England and Scotland to provide a voice for older people.
- Legislate for a National Care Service to be integrated with the NHS that remains free at the point of delivery
- Combat social exclusion and poverty by maintaining long-term access to cash and cash free withdrawal services, and providing increased support for banks and businesses to develop more accessible tools.
- Maintain the State Pension Triple Lock, protect the State Pension Age and uprate Pension Credit in line with the State Pension.
- Strengthen the Lifetime Homes standard into a National Housing Strategy to provide accessible and affordable housing.
- Increase investment in and uprate concessions for local bus services and improved accessibility for older people.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

1. Find out who your local candidates are

Prospective parliamentary candidates can be found on the following website: <https://whocanivotefor.co.uk/>.

You can also try the website of your local council which is likely to have a list of candidates.

2. Write to all local candidates and ask them how they will enable older people to live an ambitious and fulfilling life

- It is important to write to all candidates in your constituency, even if you feel that a particular candidate is likely to be more supportive.
- Email addresses for candidates can usually be found on their website. Please note that it is not possible to find contact details for every candidate, as some choose not to share this information publicly.
- If there are no direct contact details available, you can try to contact them through social media. You can also contact candidates through their party's local branch. You can find these by ringing the main telephone line for the political party and asking for further details:

Template letter

The following template letter has been designed to be sent to all candidates in your constituency either through email or the post. The sections highlighted in yellow should be filled in with your details. [Download an editable version](#).

I live in **[name of constituency]** and am writing to ask your support in addressing the challenges facing those in later life during your campaign and into the future.

I am a member of the Later Life Ambitions. Later Life Ambitions is a campaigning organisation which brings together the collective voices of over 250,000 older people through three organisations – the National Federation of Occupational Pensioners, the Civil Service Pensioners' Alliance and the National Association of Retired Police Officers. We campaign nationally, regionally and locally on a wide range of issues to improve the lives of older people. We have ambitious aspirations for pensioners.

From an Older People's Commissioner to a National Social Care Service, maintaining the Triple Lock State Pension to a delivering a National Housing Strategy, we are focused on issues that impact older people the most.

We require bold and forward-looking action from our political leaders to address challenges facing older people and implement solutions. So, we urge you to recognise the value of older people, and provide an aspirational, ambitious future for those in later life.

As my prospective MP, I would like you to support the following calls for the next Government to:

- Create a Commissioner for Older People and Ageing for England and Scotland
- Legislate for a National Care Service to be integrated with the NHS that remains free at the point of delivery
- Maintain long-term access to cash and cash free withdrawal services, and providing increased support for banks and businesses to develop more accessible tools to combat digital exclusion
- Maintain the State Pension Triple Lock, protect the State Pension age and uprate Pension Credit in line with the State Pension.
- Strengthen the Lifetime Homes standard into a National Housing Strategy to provide accessible and affordable housing.
- Increase investment in and uprate concessions for local bus services and improved accessibility for older people.

I would appreciate your response to the issues I have outlined above.

3. Seek a meeting with candidates in your local area to talk to them about ensuring older people have the opportunity to live ambitious later lives.

- In addition to writing to your candidate, you may want to seek a face-to-face meetings with them as it is more likely to have an impact and candidates will be interested in meeting with constituents in the run-up to the election.
- If you have met with a local candidate in the run-up to the General Election who then goes on to win a seat in Parliament, it will be much easier to arrange future meetings with them as an MP. The run up to the General Election is therefore an important time to build relationships with future parliamentarians.
- If you secure a meeting, the most important thing is to speak about your personal story and how Later Life Ambition's asks will ensure yourself and other older people can have good quality, affordable social care, a fair deal on pensions, and housing which enables you to continue living aspirational later lives.
- You should also tell them what they can do to help. It is important to come to the meeting with 'actions' in mind, for example:
 - Print off a copy of Later Life Ambition's Manifesto (available on our website) and take it with you to the meeting.
 - Get a picture with them, you can then share this on social media.
 - Ask them to champion the rights of the UK's older people if they are elected as an MP by organising a meeting with the new Secretary of State for Work and Pensions or the new Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, in what will be one of their first acts as an MP.
- You should use the meeting as an opportunity to secure support from other candidates in your constituency. If you let other candidates in the constituency know that their rival has met with you and is supporting the Later Life Ambition's campaign, can encourage them to show their support.
- Follow up with the candidate by writing them a short email or letter. Thank them for their time and thoughts, and for their support, if appropriate.

4. Attend local campaign events and debates to ask about commitments to older people.

- A hustings event is a meeting where election candidates or parties debate policies and answer questions from the audience. Hustings provide voters with an opportunity to hear the views of candidates or parties.
- Debates usually happen closer to election day. To find one near you check your local council website or local news publication.

- If you are able to ask a question at an event you attend, you can ask one of the questions below or ask your own.
 - How are you planning to raise awareness and address issues facing older people including accessible transport, affordable housing, and committing to the triple lock, if/when you get into post?
 - Are you concerned about how the cost of living is impacting older people and how do you plan to address it?
 - What do you see as the main challenges facing older people?
 - The move to more digital services, such as online banking, risks excluding those who cannot access online services. How do you plan to ensure that groups affected, such as those in later life, are not digitally excluded?

5. Inform Connect about any interaction you have with any candidate

- Please email Connect, Later Life Ambitions' Westminster based team, to let them know about any engagement you have with any of your local candidates. - Connect can then use this information to follow up with any candidate who is elected at the General Election.
